#### **Anti-Racism Directorate**

The Anti-Racism Directorate was created in February 2016 and works to address and prevent systemic racism in government policy, legislation, programs and services

#### **Background**

Systemic racism continues to create barriers for Indigenous and racialized communities in Ontario.

Examples of these barriers can be seen in:

- the higher numbers of Indigenous and Black people within the child welfare and justice systems
- the Truth and Reconciliation Commission's final report, which highlights that <u>Indigenous people continue to face systemic racism</u>
- attacks on Muslim-Canadians and their places of worship

We're committed to looking at what lies beneath these trends and statistics, and identifying, addressing and removing these barriers wherever possible.

#### Our mandate

The directorate aims to:

- decrease systemic racism in institutions governed or regulated by the Ontario government
- increase awareness and understanding of systemic racism among the public
- promote fair practices and policies that lead to racial equity
- collaborate with the community, business organizations, government and the Ontario Human Rights Commission

To achieve these goals, we're focusing on four key areas:

- 1. Policy, research and evaluation
  - use evidence to identify, monitor and prevent systemic racism in Ontario
  - ensure an anti-racism perspective is applied in creating, implementing and evaluating government policies, programs and services

- 2. Public education and awareness
  - o increase public education and awareness of systemic racism
- 3. Community collaboration
  - build relationships between government and racialized and Indigenous communities to better address issues of racism
- 4. Sustainable governance
  - develop a long-term accountable and transparent organization that helps the government address systemic racism

Please note, the directorate is not a court and will not investigate individual cases or make legal decisions on cases of racism or discrimination under the law.
