Anti-racism strategy shaped in Thunder Bay

The Ontario minister for anti-racism says issues in Thunder Bay are completely different than the rest of Ontario.

Michael Coteau and the Anti-Racism Directorate held a three-hour open meeting Saturday at the Da Vinci Centre, which was attended by more than 100 people.



The meeting allowed members of the public to come forward and speak about their perspectives on systemic racism

"The issues that came up (Saturday) are so different than what we've encountered in other jurisdictions," Coteau said. "There's such a heavy emphasis on the effects of colonization and how it's helped build the system we find here today in Ontario."

Coteau and his ministerial staff have been hosting similar meetings across Ontario as they develop an antiracism strategy, which they expect to roll out in the spring.

One person who addressed the meeting was Darius Ferris, a band councillor in Constance Lake First Nation.

Ferris said getting a chance to talk to the anti-racism directorate gives indigenous people a voice.

"I think this is an opportunity for us as First Nations people who have been affected by systemic racism and also a lack of government care for First Nations people," Ferris said.

"Especially with education system and also the health-care system. It's not up to par. There's a lack of funding in that area and housing as well."

Ferris said the ongoing mental health and addictions crises in many remote northern communities, and lack of government intervention, are examples of systemic racism.



"A lot of (our youth) in First Nations communities or within First Nations people ourselves we're caught in this turmoil of addictions," Ferris said.

"We need the government to step up and help us because that's robbing our youth of their future, their health and their lives and everything they can be doing or want to achieve in life like their education, families or careers.'

Ferris added there seems to be a growing understanding among non-indigenous people about historical

Coteau said Education Minister Mitzie Hunter is working on enhancing the curriculum to address the effects of colonization and residential schools, while Minister of Advanced Education and Skills Development Deb Matthews is looking at ways of strengthening opportunities for culturally relevant information and sensitivities around learning and historical impacts in post-secondary education.

Coun. Rebecca Johnson, who is a member of the city's anti-racism and respect advisory committee, spoke about initiatives that are taking place in Thunder Bay.

She said it started with city council passing a motion nearly a decade ago acknowledging racism is present.

"I think the first you have to do is admit you have a problem," Johnson said. "If you don't admit you have a problem, we just go in circles doing nothing about it. We identified we had racism. We have racism in Thunder Bay so we're working on that.

"We have a committee, we have people. we have money we're setting aside for this. It's not just a token. We know we have this problem so we're trying to address.

Johnson also called on Coteau and the province to work collaboratively with municipalities and their strategies that have been developed or are being implemented.

"We have an opportunity here to make some input into what's going to happen at the provincial level," Johnson

Coteau seemed to be in favour of that idea.

"I think that's something I'm going to recommend we build right into the plan that we need to be able to collect initiatives and ideas," Coteau said. "Know what's happening, keep our ear to the ground, capture that and share it with other jurisdictions so they can benefit off the mistakes and successes of other jurisdictions."

Coteau said developing the provincial plan remains a work in progress, which changes after every session.

"What we learned today is a little different than what we learned yesterday but collectively we'll build a plan that's good for Ontario." Coteau said.




