- 9 in public and partly in camera due to the nature of the
- 10 different appointments that need to be approved.

- 12 TREASURER SCHABAS: I'm hard to hear?
- 13 Sorry. I'll move the microphone closer.
- 14 MR. BICKFORD: I find it hard to hear.
- 15 TREASURER SCHABAS: Just a minute.
- 16 BENCHER: That's because you're in
- 17 Thunder Bay, Fred.
- 18 TREASURER SCHABAS: Can you hear me
- 19 better now?

- 19 MR. LAPPER: It's Rob Lapper. I'm

- 21 SECRETARY: Thanks, Rob.
- TREASURER SCHABAS: Thank you very much,
- 23 Mr. Varro. That could be the longest portion of the
- 24 meeting.
- 25 -- MOTIONS:

1	TREASURER SCHABAS: Turning to the
2	agenda, there is a motion for the committee
3	appointments. I'm going to ask for a mover and a
4	seconder. Ms. McGrath, seconded by Mr. Beach. Thank
5	you very much.
6	I'll just say a few words about it. I
7	believe the committees worked well in the past year,
8	2016, 2017, and I've discussed with a number of the
9	chairs how they've worked and who are content largely
10	with the makeup of the committees and keen to keep
11	working on the agendas set for them.
12	So the changes to the committees are
13	quite modest, made after discussion with a number of
14	you and consideration by me. I continue to strive to
15	keep the size of the committees manageable, if I can
16	put it that way. It is a challenge and this is
17	something I know that the Governance Task Force will
18	also be looking at and coming forward with
19	recommendations in the coming year.
20	I've also, you'll notice, left the task
21	forces and working groups intact for the time being.
22	Some of them will be completing either their mandate or
23	significant portions of their work over the next month
24	or two, and I'm mindful of that and will be examining

whether or not those task forces should continue in

- 1 their present form, whether there is a way to look at a
- 2 more efficient process for our task forces, and also
- 3 assessing whether we're looking at the right issues in
- 4 the right way.
- 5 So that's something that I expect I will
- 6 be talking to many of you about over the next month or
- 7 two and we will be bringing back to Convocation some
- 8 proposals on that in the near future.
- 9 Finally, just with respect to one of the
- 10 items on the motion, you'll see that the third motion
- is that Suzanne Clément be appointed to the Complaints
- 12 Resolution Commissioner Selection Committee established
- 13 under Ontario Regulation. So there is a regulation
- 14 that provides for a selection committee for the
- 15 Complaints Resolution Commissioner.
- The chair of that is to be a Lay Bencher
- appointed by Convocation. Another member is another
- Bencher appointed by me, who will be Mr. Rosenthal, and
- 19 the third member is appointed by the Attorney General
- and, Mr. Varro, we've just learned today that it will
- 21 be Juliet Robin, who is the Assistant Deputy Minister
- of Policy for the Ministry. So I just wanted to
- 23 clarify that in case some of you were wondering what
- 24 that was about. So that's provided for by the
- 25 regulation.

- 1 So with that, I will unmute the phone
- 2 and see if there's any comments, questions that people
- 3 wish to make. The floor is open.
- 4 MR. MURRAY: Yes, I'd like to speak to
- 5 the motion.
- TREASURER SCHABAS: Yes, Mr. Murray?
- 7 MR. MURRAY: Can I go now?
- 8 TREASURER SCHABAS: Yes, go ahead.
- 9 MR. MURRAY: My comments are going to be
- 10 brief and they only relate to the issue of the
- 11 out-of-town Life Benchers that have been left out once
- again to appointments to the standing committees, and I
- 13 take strong exception to that decision.
- 14 I notice that the two Toronto Life
- 15 Benchers have been appointed -- reappointed to the
- 16 committees, and I have no problem whatsoever with that
- 17 decision. My concern is that the Life Benchers from
- out of Toronto have been left off the committees,
- 19 standing committees, and I think that consideration
- should have been given to the helpfulness of having
- 21 those people, and there are only a handful of us,
- reappointed. So that's what I wanted to say.
- 23 TREASURER SCHABAS: Thank you. Is there
- 24 anybody else who wishes to speak? Ms. Richer is in the
- 25 room.

- 1 MS. RICHER: I'll just agree with Ross.
- 2 I was disappointed to not see the few remaining Life
- 3 Benchers on the list. I think, in the big scheme of
- 4 things, it's a mistake.
- 5 TREASURER SCHABAS: Anybody else on the
- 6 telephone?
- 7 MR. LERNER: Yes, Mr. Lerner. First, I
- 8 agree with Mr. Murray and, secondly, I intend to vote
- 9 against the motion not because I object or disagree
- 10 with any of these specific appointments for the
- 11 personalities, I believe that every committee should
- have a Chair or a Vice-Chair from outside of Toronto.
- I also think the Priority and Planning Committee should
- 14 be composed of an equal number of in Toronto and out of
- 15 Toronto Benchers. That not being the case, I intend to
- 16 vote against the motion.
- 17 MR. BICKFORD: It's Fred Bickford. I
- agree with Michael and I also agree with Ross and
- 19 Susan.
- MR. FALCONER: Julian Falconer here, if
- 21 it's the appropriate timing.
- TREASURER SCHABAS: Go ahead, Mr.
- 23 Falconer.
- MR. FALCONER: Treasurer, my thought is
- 25 that with this concern, which I certainly include in my

- 1 perspective to be a legitimate concern in the sense
- 2 that there has to be a feeling of engagement across the
- 3 jurisdictions.
- 4 You know, leaving aside the merits of
- 5 whether people are or are not excluded appropriately,
- 6 it sounds to me very much like an issue for the
- 7 Governance Committee, which is an issue I identify, I
- 8 agree there is a jurisdictional issue, but I identify a
- 9 fundamental issue, which is how do we take advantage of
- 10 the wisdom of what amounts to be our senior governance
- 11 folks; in other words, the Life Benchers.
- 12 Our ability to be guided by and assisted
- 13 by those with the most experience in our ranks,
- 14 regardless of the fact of whether they're elected or
- 15 not, I think it's a live governance issue that I think
- 16 the committee that is currently constituted, we should
- 17 be looking at identifying and getting some serious
- 18 recommendations on.
- 19 If I'm out of line in the sense that
- they're already doing that, my apologies, but I think
- 21 that that very much addresses certainly what Mr. Murray
- 22 raised.
- 23 TREASURER SCHABAS: Well, this is very
- 24 much on the agenda of the Governance Task Force; the
- 25 role of all Benchers and the different categories of

- 1 Benchers is under consideration by the Governance Task
- 2 Force.
- 3 As I explained a year ago, my goal was
- 4 to reduce the size of the committees, and one of the
- 5 ways in which that was done, frankly, was giving
- 6 priority to those who are the currently elected and
- 7 appointed Benchers who are accountable to our members
- 8 and the public through the electoral process.
- 9 There are two Life Benchers on the
- 10 Toronto committees. That was at the specific request
- 11 of the chairs of those committees for their specific
- 12 wisdom and expertise in that area, and I've maintained
- 13 that.
- 14 Some of this, this is the first time
- 15 I've heard Mr. Lerner's concerns. I know the concerns
- of some of the others about the role of Life Benchers
- and, as I've said, that is under review by the
- 18 Governance Task Force.
- 19 Are there any other comments? Anybody
- 20 else wish to say something?
- MR. WRIGHT: Yes, Brad. I would like to
- 22 speak.
- TREASURER SCHABAS: Go ahead,
- 24 Mr. Wright.
- 25 MR. WRIGHT: Thank you, Treasurer. The

- legislation provides for Life Benchers. The Governance
- 2 Task Force may be looking at whether or not to
- 3 recommend their abolition, but until that happens, we
- 4 are there by legislation.
- I don't think it's proper to exclude us
- 6 almost entirely, especially the out-of-towners, when we
- 7 are there by legislation and we do have perspectives to
- 8 bring forward for the advantage of the electorate.
- 9 TREASURER SCHABAS: All right.
- 10 MR. WRIGHT: I'm going to speak briefly
- 11 about the solicitor's side of things. As you know, in
- most of the world, barristers and solicitors are
- separate positions for sensible reasons.
- 14 The areas of law are very different;
- think murder trial versus creating a planned
- subdivision. The areas require very different skill
- 17 sets. They attract very different personality types.
- 18 We comprise at least 50 percent of the private bar.
- 19 When you add the non-private bar, barristers are quite
- 20 a bit less than 50 percent of the profession, and I say
- 21 God bless barristers, but they are very much
- 22 over-represented in a body that governs the entire
- 23 profession, and solicitors are very much
- 24 under-represented.
- 25 And the solicitors, perspectives that

- 1 solicitors bring have a hard time being heard and
- 2 having beneficial influence. I appreciate it's not
- 3 your fault, but there are not enough elected solicitors
- 4 to go around, and one hopes the Governance Task Force
- 5 will look at effective ways to correct that problem.
- In the meantime, there are other
- 7 solicitors to be found among the legislatively
- 8 provided ranks of the Life Benchers, who have a good
- 9 track record of contribution. I don't understand why
- 10 you don't use them.
- 11 Recently the Advertising Working Group
- was about to bring forward a flawed rule concerning
- 13 real estate advertising. I truly wish that they had
- drafted the rule well, but unfortunately the rule as
- drafted would have been worse than no rule because it
- 16 would have, in effect, given a pat on the head to
- 17 misleading advertising.
- The problem is not the people on the
- working group, they're all great and they're all well
- intentioned, the problem was the lack of more people on
- 21 it who actually practice in the area today and saw the
- 22 problem immediately. That resource has been available
- all along, but wasn't used. It should be used.
- 24 The Tribunal Committee features no
- 25 solicitors on it at all. Let's concede that that makes

- sense, tribunals work is largely barrister-oriented,
- 2 but the real estate working group is made up of
- 3 50 percent barristers, five out of ten. Probably none
- 4 of them have ever done a real estate deal in their
- 5 lives, or not in many years, and the system has changed
- 6 a lot since then. Why not reduce the number of
- 7 barristers on the real estate working group from five
- 8 to three or four and add one or two solicitors from the
- 9 ranks of the Life Benchers to help out? There is no
- 10 good reason not to do that.
- 11 And picking up on what Mr. Lerner said,
- there's another problem, and I'm not taking anything
- away from the intelligence and the talents of the
- downtown male Toronto barrister Benchers, they're a
- great group, but all the chairs of the major standing
- 16 committees are male barristers, almost all of them
- downtown Toronto male barristers.
- 18 With great respect, Treasurer, I don't
- 19 see that as healthy diversity. It could be seen as
- 20 carelessness where over half the bar is concerned, and
- it could even be seen that it's disrespectful of other
- 22 demographics such as women, and I'm sure, Treasurer,
- 23 that that's not your intention, but that seems to be
- 24 the effect of it.
- 25 With great respect, I wish you would

- 1 consider more carefully the over half of the bar that
- 2 has almost always been and continues to be shortchanged
- 3 in Convocation and on committees. I submit to you,
- 4 sir, that simple fairness and, frankly, better
- 5 decision making demands it. Thank you.
- 6 TREASURER SCHABAS: Thank you. Is there
- 7 anybody else that wishes to speak?
- 8 MS. POTTER: Yes.
- 9 TREASURER SCHABAS: Who's that?
- 10 MS. POTTER: Judith Potter. And I
- 11 wanted to --
- MR. BICKFORD: I'm having difficulty
- 13 hearing Judith Potter.
- MS. POTTER: Well, I'm doing the best I
- 15 can. Can you hear me?
- 16 TREASURER SCHABAS: Go ahead, Ms.
- 17 Potter. We can hear you.
- MS. POTTER: Can you hear me better now?
- 19 TREASURER SCHABAS: Yes.
- 20 MS. POTTER: Okay. I was trying to get
- 21 my name on the list well before most of speakers, but
- 22 I'm on now.
- 23 First, I'd like to say that I wanted to
- say the same thing, make the comments about the
- 25 regulation with respect to Life Benchers and the work

- of the task force that's looking at governance. I echo
- the remarks made by Mr. Wright on that subject.
- 3 The other thing is that I am
- disappointed, after we had our dinner -- this may be
- 5 for the benefit of the other Benchers -- after the Life
- 6 Benchers had a dinner with the Treasurer in June, we
- 7 expressed our concerns and our points of view, most of
- 8 which have been reflected in the comments you've heard
- 9 today, but not all, and not all the attendees are on
- 10 the phone today.
- 11 And I do think it's unfortunate, you
- 12 know, I'm not going to belabour the points that have
- 13 been made, but I totally agree that we do have a
- 14 perspective and we do have a right to be on those
- 15 committees. Moreover, I would like you to consider
- 16 that, according to the statistics, ageism is the
- 17 biggest form of discrimination in our country, and I
- 18 would say in North America.
- 19 I think it's unfortunate that we
- sideline the Life Benchers because obviously we are the
- older, we are the elders of the group, and I think we
- do have much to contribute.
- 23 We're always (inaudible) and moreover,
- 24 we're open to discussing and meeting with the other
- 25 Benchers and we don't have that opportunity if we're

- 1 not on committees. We miss committee day, so we miss
- 2 the socialization aspect of getting to know our
- 3 fellows.
- I would just like to finally wrap up by
- 5 adding, yes, we are not prone to being kicked out by
- 6 the lawyers and paralegals in the -- well, lawyers in
- 7 this case -- in the province because we are not
- 8 elected, but we all have been elected for a complete
- 9 four year term, but we have all been elected for at
- 10 least 15 years and we do have the interests of the
- 11 profession and the public at heart, and we've shown
- 12 that and proven that and I'm sorry that the Treasurer
- 13 has taken this ongoing position of not including us.
- 14 Thank you.
- 15 TREASURER SCHABAS: Is there anybody
- 16 else on the telephone who wishes to speak? Hearing
- 17 nobody else --
- MS. LEIPER: Sorry, Treasurer, it's
- Janet Leiper. Could I speak briefly?
- TREASURER SCHABAS: Go ahead, Ms.
- 21 Leiper.
- 22 MS. LEIPER: Thank you. Very briefly,
- 23 I'm listening with interest because of course it's all
- through the governance lens that we're all going to be
- 25 working on together in the fall. I do see the issue

- 1 has fallen into a broader context, and that is the
- desire of all of us, and there are a lot of us, to
- 3 participate as much as we can because it's great work,
- 4 interesting work, we like to be part of it, so there's
- 5 that piece that I am very sympathetic to.
- 6 I'm also sympathetic to the difficulty
- 7 for the Treasurer in trying to combine efficiency,
- 8 ability, interest and fairness, and we can slice it
- 9 into any number of different demographics, in and out
- 10 of Toronto, racialized, non-racialized, gender, age,
- so I guess if speak for one of the earlier speakers,
- 12 the notion that, look, we are going to be working on
- 13 this together and it includes committee membership,
- makeup, all of it, and very soon, actually, in October.
- 15 I also see as a key piece to this
- there's also the leadership aspect, and we have put our
- 17 vote behind the Treasurer, Paul Schabas, after
- 18 consulting and speaking to people and not sure that he
- 19 can please everybody, but I think he's been
- 20 consultative with all of us, including people who may
- 21 not have (inaudible) wanted.
- I do intend to vote for it, knowing that
- 23 we are going to be revisiting this as a group, but I
- think for now that it's a good thing for us to support
- 25 the report. Thanks.

- 1 TREASURER SCHABAS: Anybody else on the
- 2 telephone? If not, we'll put it to a vote. I suppose
- 3 we'll have to hear from -- maybe I'll ask in the room,
- 4 all in favour? Who's in favour? So those in the room
- 5 are in favour.
- I guess I'll ask who -- I know a couple
- of people expressed a view that they would vote against
- 8 it. Perhaps we could -- those who are planning to vote
- 9 against it, if they could just confirm their names.
- 10 MR. LERNER: Michael Lerner.
- 11 TREASURER SCHABAS: Mr. Lerner. Anybody
- 12 else against? I guess Mr. Lerner on the telephone is
- 13 voting against and otherwise I'll take it that
- 14 everybody else is in favour and the motion is carried.
- 15 Thank you.
- 16 We'll then move to the second motion,
- which is the motion to appoint Ms. Walker to the
- 18 Tribunal, and we need a mover and a seconder for that,
- 19 I believe. Ms. McGrath, seconded by Ms. Clément. And
- 20 Ms. Leiper is coming off the tribunal, that's the other
- 21 part of that motion.
- So all in favour in the room? Thank
- you. Anybody opposed to that on the telephone?
- 24 Hearing silence, then the motion is carried.
- 25 --- Whereupon the public proceedings adjourned at 9:27 a.m.
